

Excerpts from the church history, 1888-1988, written by Eulah Blaine and Bernice Hubbell-Lee

Benjamin and Mary Campbell arrived in California by wagon train in October, 1852, and settled in what would become the town of Campbell. They had been members of the Methodist Church South in Missouri. At that time, the Santa Clara Valley was a grain and cattle region with few inhabitants and fewer churches. Itinerant ministers served the various settlements on circuit type schedules. The home of Benjamin Campbell was a welcome resting and preaching point for these circuit riders.



Gradually, the town grew. In 1887, a gathering place was needed, so ten or twelve families bought shares of stock to build a Town Hall. In the spring of 1888, the Reverend G.W. Beatty of Los Gatos Methodist Church held regular Methodist services in the Town Hall. On July 17, 1888, he formed a "Class of Twelve", which became the Campbell Methodist Church.



"Forgive Us"

This question just doesn't go away! We read it at least as far back as when St. Peter asked Jesus, "Lord, if another member of the church sins against me, how often should I forgive?" (Matthew 18:21a)¹ On the one hand, we could wander into the swamp of uncertainty about just how often Jesus said that we had to forgive. The translators disagree. It could be 77, or it could be 70×7 . Not ready to argue that point? Good. Well, how about stumbling deeper into the swamp of uncertainty as we wonder whether it's only Christians that we have to forgive vs. the rest of the world? After all, Peter did refer in his question to Iesus to "another member of the church (who) sins against me".

On the other hand, we could leave the scholarly details to the scholars. The heart of the matter is whether we are willing to forgive! Of course, as we know from the Lord's Prayer, it's not an academic question! Our willingness to forgive is closely connected with our need to be forgiven. Oh, did I step on someone's favorite belief? Yes, I know that some of us believe that we do not sin. To be clear, I'm as human as anyone and I have sinned—frequently and, at times, seriously. I suspect that we are all that human.

If, as I noted in the previous article on this subject, forgiveness requires that we who have offended or hurt an individual or a group "turn around" and head in the other direction, then there must be real change (in us). It is the only way to face those we have hurt and begin the process of restoration of our relationship. Why would we do that—other than the reason given in the Lord's Prayer?

Some people think of "karma" as the reason. You know, "what goes around comes around!" I prefer to think in terms of love. Someone recently quoted that line from the 1960s movie ("Love Story") where the male actor (who else?) says, "Love means never having to say you're sorry." Really? If we truly do love someone we most assuredly will need to say "I'm sorry" — probably quite a few times in the relationship.

Twice in John's Gospel Jesus is quoted giving us a new commandment that helps to answer our question of how often to forgive: "I give you a new commandment Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another." (John 13:34; 15:12) That is a deceptively easy commandment to acknowledge. What it requires of us is nothing less than sacrificial love—love that will seek forgiveness when wrong and extend it to others.

Loving someone enough to forgive, especially when they have caused real suffering, is a lot to ask. But Jesus indicates that it's a vital part of what it means to live in God's kingdom. How often do we forgive? We forgive as often as Jesus is ready to forgive us!
